Why bother? It helps with far more than voting

Nothing here is required to vote in New Jersey in 2026. Consistent records are simply good practice, whatever happens in Washington:



Travel

REAL ID is now enforced for domestic flights. Airlines expect your documents to match.



Passports

Applications and renewals go faster when your name chain is complete.



Money and benefits

Social Security, banking, and payroll systems flag mismatched names.

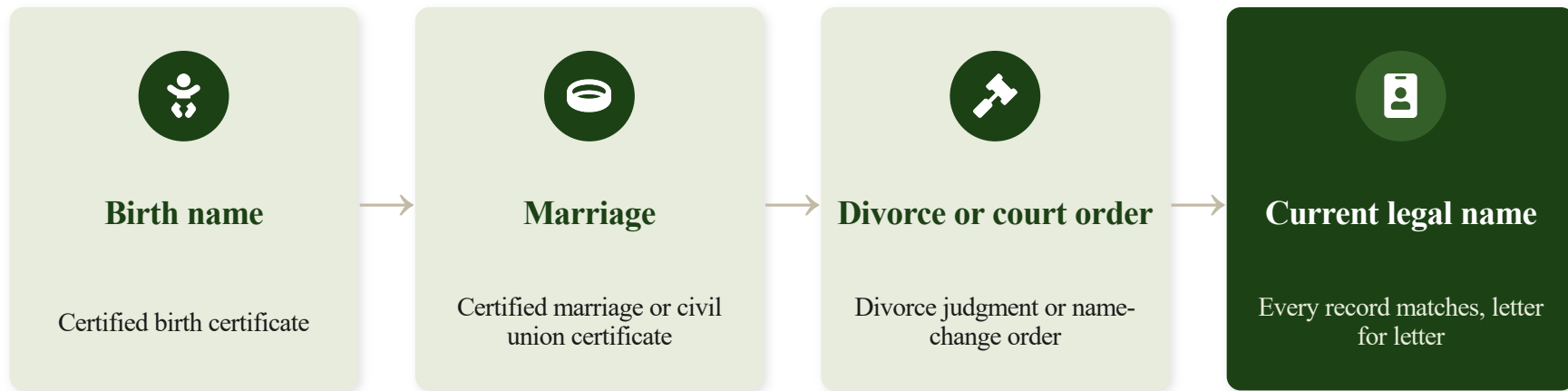


Peace of mind

If a documentation rule ever takes effect, aligned records mean the fewest hurdles.

The goal: an unbroken name chain

Your birth certificate always shows your birth name. It is never updated for marriage or divorce. The goal is a certified document for every link between that name and the name you use today.



Order certified copies, not photocopies. Agencies rarely accept photocopies for identity purposes.

Build your certified document inventory



Certified birth certificate

N.J. births: Office of Vital Statistics and Registry, or your town's local registrar. Born elsewhere: that state's vital records office (the CDC keeps a directory).



Marriage or civil union certificate

From the vital records office where the marriage took place. Replaceable if lost, but allow lead time.



Divorce judgment

Especially one restoring a prior name. Certified copies come from the Superior Court in the county of the divorce.



Court name-change order

For changes outside marriage. In N.J., adults petition the Superior Court; marriage itself needs no court order.



Naturalization or citizenship certificate

Replacements use USCIS Form N-565. Fees run several hundred dollars and processing takes months, so locate the original now.



Consular Report of Birth Abroad

For citizens born overseas to U.S. citizen parents. Replaceable through the Department of State.

The passport: one document that does it all



A valid U.S. passport proves citizenship in your current legal name.

It resolves the name-mismatch problems that birth-record paths create. About half of Americans do not have one.

How to get or update one

- First passport: Form DS-11, filed in person
- Most renewals: Form DS-82, by mail
- Name change within one year of issue: Form DS-5504, free
- Passport card: a lower-cost option that also shows citizenship (not valid for international flights)

Routine processing takes several weeks. Do not wait for a deadline.

After a name change, update agencies in order

Each agency's record feeds the next, so the sequence matters:

1

Social Security

Form SS-5 with certified proof of the change. Free. An unmatched Social Security name causes payroll and benefits flags on its own.

2

N.J. Motor Vehicle Commission

Update your license or state ID under the 6 Point ID program. Note: a N.J. REAL ID does not show citizenship.

3

Voter registration

File an updated registration form, the same form used for new registrations. Free, and it prevents polling-place friction.

Keep your name identical letter for letter everywhere, including middle names and suffixes. Data systems treat small differences as mismatches.
